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

She lives on a farm. She has her own chickens.








Her rooster wakes her at sunrise.

Sometimes Clara sleeps late. Her mama says, "Time to feed the chickens." All kids sleep late sometimes.






Maria uses a computer at school.

After school, Maria helps her dad. They shop. They scan their food. They pay with a credit card.






Keith and his mom pay the store clerk.

...with family and friends.






After dinner, Maria listens to music. She uses her ear buds and a smartphone.

Clara writes a letter to her grandparents.








She brings it to the Post Office.
